Course Description:

English W131 will offer exercises and practice "in writing organized, well-developed, researched papers for a variety of purposes and audiences" (IPFW Catalog of Courses). The focus of the course will be largely on research strategies, subject matter in student writing, familiarization with audience in writing, and analysis of familiar genres. Gradually, the course will move from more familiar writing genres and methodology to less familiar areas.

General Course Goals (Specific Course Goals on separate sheet):

Upon completion of W131, students should be able to:

- Read critically and write clearly and persuasively in various rhetorical contexts.
- Apply methods of inquiry appropriate to various rhetorical contexts.
- Demonstrate critical thinking through the interrelated activities of reading and writing.

Course Requirements:

Out-of-class writing:

- Journaling (1-2 pages per week)
- Paper 1: Memoir (3-5 pages)
- Paper 2: Proposal (3-5 pages)
- Paper 3: Review (4-6 pages)
- Paper 4: Research (6-10 pages)

Portfolio:

• All writing for the entire semester collected

• Revised versions of four main papers

Class Participation:

- In-class writing
- Active class discussion
- Peer review
- Attendance

Evaluation:

Final grades for the course will be based on the following:

Final Portfolio 70% Journal 15% Class Participation 15%

Portfolio:

Portfolios will be graded largely on improvement but also on criteria determined by the entire class with guidance from the instructor. All work from the entire semester will be included in the portfolio but only final drafts will be given letter grades. Incomplete portfolios will not be graded.

Journal:

Students will be required to write one to two pages per week in their journals. Journals will be graded solely on completeness and not on content. A student who writes two pages per week receives an A. A student who writes one page receives a C. A student who does not write in their journal receives an F.

Conferences:

A conference will be scheduled with each individual student to discuss progress near the middle of the course. A second conference will be held at the end of the semester to discuss progress in the class, especially as reflected in the portfolio, and to inform students of their final grade.

Attendance:

Students are permitted to miss up to three classes without repercussions. Subsequent absences will affect your participation grade (unless there is a valid reason for the absence). Any in-class writing or peer review missed on a day when you are absent will also affect your participation grade. *Attendance is strongly encouraged*.

Tardiness:

Being late to class is disruptive and frowned upon. Three instances of tardiness will count as an absence.

Late Papers:

Late papers will only be reviewed if discussed with the professor before the due date. Late portfolios will not be accepted.

Format of Papers:

All papers should be in Times New Roman 12 point font or equivalent (please no fancy fonts), should be double spaced, and should have one inch margins all around.

Plagiarism:

Deliberate plagiarism, including purchased papers, present in portfolio writing will result in a failure of the course. Unintentional plagiarism will result in an incomplete, and the student will be allowed to resubmit the portfolio when the errors have been remedied.

Resourses:

- The Writing Center, located in Kettler 234, is a free tutoring service to IPFW students. Consultants read all or part of your paper and discuss with you ways in which it can be improved. The Writing Center, however, *does not edit* your work. Hours are Sunday 1-5, Monday 10-5, Tuesday-Thursday 10-7, and Friday 10-1. The Writing Center is closed Saturdays.
