## **Learning Objectives:**

## **Basics**

The basics are the minimum requirements for the Final Reflection.

- Reflect on a minimum of three things you think you have learned this semester. Consider
  what you have learned from major projects, homework, in-class work, or anything in the
  class.
- Explain specifically what you have learned. In particular, try to consider what you can do now that you could not in August.
- Project your learning to future contexts. Try to think of how you might use this knowledge in other classes, outside of school, or in your future career.
- Your reflection can be either multimodal or a traditional paper, although I encourage multimodal elements to help you make points.
- Submit your reflection in the Google Drive folder for this class. Your files should be named with your name, your class, and the assignment (i.e. Malcolm Reynolds ENG 3850 Final Reflection).

# **Grading**

Grading for the reflection is a little more detailed than the other two tasks but is still relatively simple. You will be graded on:

- Explanation: You explain what you have learned in this class. You are detailed and specific.
- **Application:** You have applied what you've learned to a future situation or situations. You are detailed and specific.
- **Effort:** You have taken the assignment seriously and attempted to make real connections across contexts.

While most students get an A on the final reflection as long as they attempt to meet the expectations, if you do not fully meet the criteria above, your grade may be lower.
